FROM THE EDITOR

Welcome to the August edition, the seventeenth, of the monthly High Lane U3A newsletter. Well, at last, we can report that restrictions have been removed and it is now legally possible for groups to meet up again. However, we are aware that attitudes vary across our members with some keen to get back to face to face groups but many still concerned about the high level of cases and hospitalisations being reported daily. We welcome back all those who feel able to attend whilst fully respecting those who prefer to bide their time.

We will expect all those who attend face to face meetings to be double vaccinated or to have a recent negative Covid test. We ask you to follow all relevant public health advice, eg wearing of face masks in enclosed indoor spaces. As has been the case for some time, any member who is feeling ill, displaying Covid symptoms, has received a positive test result in the past 10 days or has been instructed to isolate must NOT participate in u3a meetings, trips and events. Any member who subsequently tests positive (within 7 days of attending) is asked to advise their group convenor(s) or meeting organisers so that all other attendees may be informed.

This edition contains some information about the AGM and a plea for members to join us in helping to run our u3a, some reports from our local groups, some news from National Office, plus some light-hearted items.


The newsletter is being sent out by email and will also be on the website. The July Newsletter Express from National Office is also being emailed with this edition of our newsletter.

Officers and Committee are to be elected at this meeting and as said above please think seriously about how you could help with this. There is a nomination form on the last page of this newsletter.

As for the EGM, only members who have renewed their membership for 2021 will be entitled to vote at the AGM. Membership renewal was due in February. If you have not yet renewed your membership, it is not too late! Please do so without delay so you are sure of continued access to our activities and newsletters. 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GUIDANCE FOR FACE-TO-FACE MEETINGS.

Your Committee met last week and the restarting of our interest groups was a major item on the agenda. The following information is for all group leaders and their members and we hope you find it useful.

1. Groupleaders should carry out a risk assessment of the venue and activity which should cover the following points. There is no need to send to the committee but please let us know when your group re-starts. Members of the group should be informed of the guidelines/safety measures of any particular venue that you use, including

- i. Encourage the use of hand sanitiser if appropriate
- ii. Ensure adequate air flow
- iii. Wiping down of any equipment used if this is required by the venue.
- iv. Maintain social distancing where possible/appropriate

2. Name and telephone numbers of attendees should be recorded for track and trace. Records should be kept for 21 days.

3. If members have not been fully vaccinated, they should have proof of a negative Covid test before attending ANY u3a meeting, wherever that may be. Advice is that tests should be taken twice per week. Members could be asked to show their vaccination cards as proof of vaccination. This may be of help to those running groups in their own homes. Please note we cannot insist on double vaccination but can insist on a recent negative test.

As with all things in our everyday lives there has to be an element of accepted risk. We are all aware that Covid has deemed that we be extra vigilant and safeguards were put in place over the past 18 months to protect us all. We have now been given our 'freedom' but with that comes responsibility. How we choose to act upon this freedom is up to each individual. All members must take personal responsibility for their own safety and should take heed of any safety measures set out from any u3a venue used before making the decision to attend or not.

At this time many members are anxious about resuming their activities and we can only set out current guidance from the National Office. In addition to this we recognise that some members who hold meetings in their own homes may not feel comfortable to resume their groups at the current time.

Currently there is u3a insurance cover but this may change when the insurance is renewed. We shall of course inform members of any changes when or if they occur.

It would be good if we could also refresh our group pages with information about what we do and some images If you can. There are some good examples on other u3a websites. One of our fellow GM network u3as, Salford u3a, has some nice examples. Is it easy for people to contact you if they are interested? To facilitate this, you can get a group leader email address for your group. If you don't have one, you can get this from Jeff. Any enquiries from the website will then be emailed to you.

MORE SCAMS

The Third Age Trust sent this information about the latest scams. Below are two experiences from u3a members who contacted us to share with other u3as.

A u3a member got in touch with us to tell us she had received a phishing email supposedly from Norton, an anti-virus software company, about payment to renew an account she does not have. It says that they will deduct over £220 unless she cancels within 48 hours. If you receive an email like this, please don't click on the links and please take independent advice before paying any unexpected requests for money.

A u3a member got in touch to tell us about a company who had taken extra money out of her bank account without her knowledge. The company involved specialises in products aimed at older adults. She contacted the bank who stopped any further charges on the card from the company and gave advice on what to do next, eventually the company paid back the money.

Please encourage your members to check their bank accounts regularly and immediately report any suspicious debits that they do not recognise. Most banks are able to put a stop to any charges and give advice on how to get refunds where appropriate.

The usual advice applies.

- Don't click on links in unsolicited texts or emails
- Do not press 1 or follow any other instructions given in an automated message
- Don't give any personal or account information to a cold caller
- Never follow instructions from an unsolicited caller to download an app or software which would allow them to access your computer remotely

DID YOU KNOW?

There are dinosaurs in Crystal Palace?

And they've been there since 1855. They were modelled from fossil remains. The sculptor, Benjamin Waterhouse Hawkins, was a natural history illustrator and sculptor of international reputation. The sculptures are set in a landscape designed by Joseph Paxton. You can find them in a corner of the huge Crystal Palace park. It's a peaceful place to sit and reflect.

There are some 30 statues, not all are dinosaurs and the statues include plesiosaurs and icthyosaurs discovered by Mary Anning in Lyme Regis, as well as pterodactyls, crocodilians, amphibians and mammals, such as a South American Megatherium (giant ground sloth) brought back to Britain by Charles Darwin on his voyage on HMS Beagle.



West has 21 points so will probably bid 2NT to show their point count. Some Wests may bid 2C but the hand is reasonably balanced even though it has two doubletons.

With 9 HCP to partner's 2NT bid, E has 9 points and a 5 card spade suit so will bid 3H to transfer partner to Spades.

West completes the transfer by bidding 3S. East knows that with at least 29 points they must be in game so will bid 3NT. East also knows they do not have enough points for a NT slam. There may be a slam in Spades but West has only two spades so will pass.

Realbridge reports that EW can make 11 tricks in Hearts or Spades but can make a small slam in NT. Most played it in 3NT making 11. The 11 tricks are easy but can you spot the 12th? To make the small slam you need to end up in the West hand and make the last heart.
