

CRIME FICTION READING

This year we have read 12 books and been pleased to have a good variety of styles and approaches. It is rare that we all like the same book and for some books there have been quite wide variations in our views – which, of course, is great. We have discovered some authors who were new to most of us and revisited some doyens of the genre.

Our top scorer this year was The Rising Tide, one of the Vera series written by Ann Cleeves in 2022. Second was The Crossing Places Elly Griffiths, published in 2009, the first book in the DI Ruth Galloway series.

Our book for December was Trouble in the Cotswolds by Rebecca Tope. Tope is a prolific writer, having written some 40 crime novels in print. Her two main series are set in the Cotswolds and the Lake District, and both feature amateur female detectives. The Cotswold series comprises 18 books and the 19th will be published shortly. Trouble in the Cotswolds is the 12th book in the series.

Thea Osborne, the female sleuth, and her dog, are house-sitting in a Cotswold village while the family is away for Christmas. Her responsibilities in the house include the care of several rats which she is supposed to allow out of the cage for exercise. Her arrival in the village coincides with the funeral of a local businessman Douglas Callendar, who was found electrocuted in his bath. This is closely followed by a second murder when another villager is discovered brutally murdered the following day. Thea is supposedly helping the police solve the crimes whilst suffering from a range of problems including a bad bout of flu, being without transport as she put the wrong fuel in her car and trying without much success to manage the housesitting. None of us liked this book. Thea was considered whinging, self-centred and it all got a bit boring. Not surprisingly, the book garnered the lowest score by far of any of our books since the group started in 2022.

Our next meeting is Thursday 9th January 2025. For this meeting we are reading The Last Widow by Karin Slaughter.

We have space for a few more members. Our normal meeting is 10am on the second Friday of the month. Do get in touch if you are interested in joining us.

CURRENT AFFAIRS

December 3rd

We discussed the Assisted Dying Bill which passed the first stage on a free vote in the House of Commons by a majority of 330 to 275. It will have another vote next year, then go to the House of Lords and may become legal in about two years. Some of the group were quite hesitant about it but eventually agreed that it was preferable to a long lingering painful death provided that adequate safeguards were put in place to prevent coercion.

There seems to be a large increase in the number of allegations of abuse by Mohamed al Fayed, Greg Wallace and John Smyth amongst others. The Archbishop of Canterbury resigned recently because although he knew about Smyth ten years earlier, he had not pursued the matter. We thought that many people who get into positions of power feel that they are above the law and can do as they like. Many young girls have reported abuse to the police, but it has not been followed up for many years because of lack of evidence.

The BBC licence fee is to increase to £147.50 next April. The fee funds much of the BBC's operation but many people are not paying the fee and accessing news, TV and radio in other ways. Its services are renowned for children's education, world class entertainment, news items and the world service which we all thought must continue. However, we considered that some people working for the BBC were paid far too much; Gary Lineker being a prime example.

We thought that the resignation of the Secretary of State for Transport, Louise Haigh, was unnecessary as she seemed to be making good progress. We liked her red hair!

Apparently, the Government is proposing that young people who are not in education or training and refuse to work will lose benefits. There are about 900,000 not working because of mental health issues or other disabilities. Job centres are to be overhauled so that there is more support. In some cases, jobs available were worth less than the benefit paid. We all agreed that as there is a shortage of workers in various industries more skills training and apprenticeships are needed.

There is room for one or two more people in the group. Do come along and try us for interesting conversation and discussion.



WALKING

Our December walk was a combination of members of the Walking Group and the Short Walks Group.

Despite the strong wind with threat of rain the group set off from the Navigation in Buxworth (originally a farm) in good



Christmas spirits. Pausing for a brief description of the surrounding history, Bugsworth Basin was constructed in 1795 and the busiest inland port linking the limestone quarries in Derbyshire to Manchester and trans Pennine canal network. Passing the replica horse transfer bridges and the former Wharfinger's house (Wharfinger – basin manager) walking along the canal tow path to cross the footbridge, following the tow path into Whaley Bridge Basin. From the basin crossing over river where rail tracks can still be seen to ascend gently the incline, at the top of the incline some members shared their knowledge of the turning circle. Descending to walk under the elaborately decorated railway bridge, along the road into the Memorial Park (created in 1920) passing by the (still under repair) dam onto Reservoir Road down to the basin.

Nearly all the group were enthusiastic to 'do the short steep path' up to Bings Farmhouse and barn (Grade 11 listed building) stopping 'to take in the views en route'. Here the group spotted reindeer!! Where was Santa? Descending down the road passing Silkhill Farm with clear views, we soon crossed over the bypass and back to the Navigation Pub for 27 folk to have a splendid Christmas Meal.


