CRIME FICTION READING

This year we have read 12 books of various vintages and have been pleased to have a good variety of styles and approaches. It is rare that we all like the same book and for some books there have been quite wide variations in our views – which, of course, is great. We have discovered some authors who were new to most of us and revisited some doyens of the genre.

Our top scorer this year was The Janus Stone by Elly Griffiths published in 2016, the second of 15 in the Ruth Galloway series. A close second was Skinner's Rules by Quintin Jardine from 1994, the first book in the long running Bob Skinner series.

Our book for December was 'The Long Shadow' by Celia Fremlin, an author none of us had read before. The response was mostly negative as we felt that although the story got off to a good start and had a satisfying ending, the middle section became rather boring and nearly all the characters unpleasant.

The story starts with the recently widowed Imogen attending a friend's party, where she is introduced to a young man, Teri a student. Escaping from the party she returns home when at 3am she is wakened by the phone ringing. It is Teri attempting to blackmail her with threats of telling the police he knows she killed Ivor, her husband. She hangs up saying it's not true but, strangely, after the police had notified her early one morning that Ivor had been killed in a road accident she never mentioned it to anyone until the following day so throughout the story we are left wondering what she was doing during that first day?

Christmas arrives bringing with it a host of uninvited and unwanted guests:- the son and daughter from Ivor's first marriage, the daughter's husband and two little boys, followed by Ivor's second ex-wife and finally a strange girl student is foisted on her as a possible lodger. During the celebrations several uncanny and rather spooky happenings occur. The guests linger over New Year and beyond, then the boys suddenly become upset remembering their old cat left at home. Without mentioning it to the others Imogen decides to collect it for them but arriving at the house various things seem odd and another strange 'happening' occurs. On the way home the blackmailing Teri appears as she waits at the station. After their initial delight in seeing the cat, the boys soon lose interest until it disappears, so Imogen takes them to search for it but with no luck. At bedtime the boys sneak out into the freezing cold to continue the search, they too disappear so Imogen goes out to find them and in doing so meets a much older woman looking for her two grandsons. From then on, all the mysteries are solved bringing the story to a neat conclusion. The boys are found nearby, the unwelcome, demanding visitors return to their own homes, Teri and the girl disappear, and Imogen is left alone, at last, having come to terms with the loss of Ivor who she now sees as a pompous, self-regarding man, a sentiment with which we all agreed.

Our next meeting is on Friday, January 16th when we shall discuss 'Opening Night' by Ngaio Marsh. Do come along if you would like to join us and maybe introduce us to more 'new to us' authors, we haven't read them all yet !!

CURRENT AFFAIRS

We discussed David Dimbleby's TV series 'What's the Monarchy For?' which several of the group had watched. The monarch has soft power and diplomacy through state visits, royal tours and the Commonwealth (remember the PM giving Trump an invitation from the King to visit the UK) These generate income from tourists.

Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle and Holyrood are all state owned. King Charles is the first billionaire monarch. He pays income tax but not inheritance tax. His income comes from the Sovereign Grant (paid by the State) and the Duchy of Lancaster for which he charges rent for NHS properties, some state schools, prisons, and docking at the port of Liverpool etc. We thought that the size of the monarchy should continue to be reduced and that Prince William would probably do so. The opinion of the group was that it was better to have a monarch under control with little real power than a dictator such as Putin or a president such as Trump.

Why does Donald Trump have such an obsession with the Lord Mayor of London Sadiq Khan? He says he is a nasty person who has done a terrible job. He is horrible, vicious and disgusting. Khan was not afraid to reply, has been elected three times and leads a liberal, multicultural and successful city with record numbers of Americans visiting. Everyone deplored the statesmanlike language Trump uses.

From a newspaper survey on things that make Christmas special, 69% said people, nostalgia and family traditions, 61% cooking and eating dinner, 56% opening presents together, 33% catching up with loved ones, 31% watching TV or films, 19% family games, 15% first cup of tea or coffee in the morning, 14% evening snacks or left overs, 3% post dinner nap. In our group, two said people, nostalgia and family traditions, one cooking and eating dinner, one opening presents together, two watching TV or films, one post dinner nap.

Should the UK introduce voluntary national service similar to Germany and France? There have been some objections from the youth in Germany. Most of the group thought this was a good idea and it might ease unemployment for a while.

Several countries have opted out of the Eurovision Song Contest next year including Spain, Netherlands, Slovenia, Iceland and Ireland. We all said we were not interested and did not watch it anyway.

Should FIFA have awarded a Peace Trophy and medal to Donald Trump at the draw for the World Cup? Canada and Mexico are also hosting. Will their presidents get trophies and medals?

A Scottish nurse won her case against the NHS about transgender changing rooms. The Supreme Court ruled that sex is biological under Equality Law. Another case is proceeding in Darlington. Transgender women and girls will no longer be offered membership of the WI or Girl Guides or be allowed to participate in female sport. Some members pointed out that the number of unisex toilets in public places is increasing.

We discussed the proposed reduction in Jury trials and that less serious crimes likely to be awarded a sentence of less than three years be referred to Magistrates Courts. The group did not feel that they had enough knowledge to pass an opinion. After all trial by Jury has been part of British law for centuries.
