THINKING ABOUT RECRUITMENT

An article in the latest issue of Third Age Matters (Autumn 2023) highlights the fact that u3a membership across the country is overwhelming female; nationally, 70% of members are female, and our ratio is much the same. Recent research found that women were much more likely to belong to interest groups and attend u3a events.

The findings showed that most men joined with their partners whereas most women joined on their own. However, other research shows that when men joined in activities and events, they experienced physical and psychological health benefits. u3a recognises the challenge of attracting and recruiting more men – it may be that a different recruitment strategy is needed. Any thoughts?



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MONTHLY MEETING



The speaker at the September meeting was Professor Nigel Linge from Salford University whose talk was called When the lines go dead. Preparing for the PSTN switch off. He told us that the technology used to provide traditional landline phone calls is outdated and will eventually fail. He gave us a very interesting and informative history of the evolution of the telephone and explained that this was the next stage. This involves the telephone providers upgrading the landline network, known as PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network) from analogue to digital which means that voice calls will be carried the same way as data over a broadband connection. The current network will close at the end of 2025. He suggested having a look at www.futureofvoice.co.uk which explains everything. This talk was very informative and well received.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday 11th October when the speaker is Dean Mottershead asking the question Have you go the right Will or do you have a Will at all?

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
u3a NORTH-WEST SUMMER SCHOOL

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CRIME FICTION READING

Our September book was One Corpse Too Many by Ellis Peters, the second book in the Cadfael series, published in 1979. A medieval mystery novel set in the summer of 1138.



In that year, King Stephen successfully besieged Shrewsbury castle held by William FitzAlan for the Empress Maud during the period known as The Anarchy. During the siege, all of the surviving defenders were hanged. Cadfael, a Benedictine monk of the nearby Shrewsbury Abbey discovers a murdered man hidden amongst the slain. He sets out to solve the mystery of this extra body and along the way helps a young girl escape the siege. and discover the motives of Hugh Beringar, her betrothed fiancé.

Cadfael books were televised by ITV starring Derek Jacobi as Brother Cadfael. One corpse too many was one of the first to be aired in 1994.

Our book for October is the Monogram Murders by Sophie Hannah. This is the first book in Hannah's series of Hercule Poirot books, continuation novels featuring characters created by Agatha Christie.

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WALKING

Wednesday 27th September 2023

Bollington, Macclesfield Canal, River Dean Valley, Waulkmill Waterfall, Rainow, Oakenbank

This 5-mile walk led by Ed Rowbottom was full of pleasant surprises - beautiful landscape - fascinating industrial archaeology - ever changing interesting scenery. The route had a few short ups and downs in keeping with the undulating character of the area and several easy gate stiles and some ancient stone pinch stiles, all easily negotiated by the 23 attendees. Walking surfaces were good and sound, one long field had a paved pathway - initially laid for the millworkers' benefit. The dry bright weather conditions at the start of the walk slowly deteriorated as the wind strengthened but mercifully the serious rain came after we had finished!

POSITIVE AGEING

u3a has shared two new conversations with members and academics exploring positive ageing, how it can be embraced and what barriers prevent people from ageing positively. Liz Ervine, u3a's Trustee for Scotland, and Sandi Rickerby, u3a's Trustee for the North East, were joined by academics, Dr Melanie Lovatt, Dr Alan Gow, Shelagh Young, Susan Murray and Dr Dwight Tse. The panel discussed how confidence can be a barrier preventing people from taking positive steps that might help them to have a more fulfilling later life – like joining u3a or other social organisations.

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INFLUENCING AND SOCIAL CHANGE

DID YOU KNOW...?

10 October 2024 is Ada Lovelace Day (ALD) This day is an international celebration of the achievements of women in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM). It aims to increase the profile of women in STEM and, in doing so, create new role models who will encourage more girls into STEM careers and support women already working in STEM. Launched in 2009 as a celebration of women in science, the event promotes programs that encourage girls and women to pursue careers in STEM. It features the flagship Ada Lovelace Day Live! 'Science cabaret' in London, UK, at which women in STEM give short talks about their work or research in an informal, theatre-like setting.

Ada Lovelace was a leading 19th century mathematician and daughter of the famous poet Lord Byron. She is widely known as the first person to recognize the potential of early computers and published the first example of what is now known as an algorithm. Lovelace recognized that computers could do more than simple number-crunching, opening the door to complex functions and ushering in the modern era of computing.
